Anita's Florentine Slice

Something sweet for April.

150g. butter or dairy alternative

3/4 cup caster sugar 70g. flaked almonds 1/2 cup raisins 1/2 cup glace cherries 1 cup plain flour

1 teaspoon baking pow-

1/4 cup dark chocolate melts

Heat oven to 180c. Melt butter and sugar in pot big enough to mix all ingredients.

Remove from heat, add almonds, raisins and cherries.

Sift flour and baking powder together, add to saucepan and mix through.

Spread into greased/lined 20cm square shallow tin. Bake 20 min or until cooked and golden.

Melt chocolate quickly in microwave.

Drizzle over while still warm.

Cut into squares or fingers while warm.

Nangara Notes

There are several races of Silvereyes and some are sedentary, some nomadic and some are migrants from Tasmania. Some of our 'Victorian' Silvereyes migrate to Northern NSW and Qld at the end of summer, mostly flying at night.





This charming little bird can be seen in local gardens, woodlands or rainforest. They seem to be particularly adaptive to their surroundings. In our district, Silvereyes have been recorded from Mt Baw Baw to Bass Coast. At Nangara Reserve, Silvereyes are often seen in a mixed flock with other small birds such as thornbills, wrens or scrubwrens.

In small family groups, Silvereyes work through the understory and midstory, gleaning insects from the foliage and bark. In some locations they are seen as a pest species as they often descend on orchards and peck at the fruit.

The typical Silvereye song is described as a whistling-trilling warble – check your phone bird app to hear it and listen for it next time you are in the reserve. Most Silvereyes pair for life and they build a small cup-shaped nest, often in a low, horizontal fork.

Apart from their distinctive white eye-ring, Silvereyes can sometimes be referred to as yet another LBBB – *little brown bush bird.*

It's currently a great time to go camping and enjoy our beautiful state, but don't let your campfire become a bushfire. Remember these tips when setting up:

- √ Keep a clear area of 3 metres around the fire
- √ Ensure the fire is no bigger than 1sq metre
- √ Someone must be at the fire at all times and have the means to extinguish it
- √ The fire must be fully extinguished when the last person leaves. To properly extinguish your campfire you need a lot of water - 10 litres is the recom-



mended amount - and it must be cool to the touch.
