'You need to post your completed ballot pack before 6 pm on Friday 25 October, noting local clearance times may vary,' Electoral Commissioner Sven Bluemmel said.

Street, Warragul before 6 pm on Friday 25 October.'

Jindivick Writers Group— Flight - (Margaret)

As children we were fascinated by our father's tiny collection, a souvenir from time spent as a soldier fighting in Papua New Guinea. We treated the contents of the blue cardboard box with great care and respect as it contained fragile exotic tropical butterflies. We could view them through a sealed transparent envelope laboriously made from cellophane outer sleeves of cigarette packets sealed with tissue paper. The flimsy windows made a crackling sound when held up to the light by our fingertips. Each one contained a different species of butterfly with wings outstretched. There were many colours-browns, oranges, white and black with red spots, some with distinctive markings which would have caught Dad's eye. My favourite was a large sapphire blue specimen with each pointed wing outlined in black.

It was an occasional treat for us to admire the delicate insects, gently holding them in wonderment before replacing them in the box. This time of quiet reflection was a precious childhood memory shared with my siblings and later my own children. With an adult's perspective, I realise this was a hobby for Dad, a way to relieve the loneliness and boredom, an escape from the horrors of war. I imagine he wanted to return home with something lovely to show Mum. In preparing his butterfly collection our peace-loving father had a brief respite from the grisly reality of jungle warfare. His only recollection passed on to me

was clothes rotted on his back due to the humid climate, which, ironically, bred a profusion of insect life, including those in his humble butterfly collection.

I imagine these butterflies released from their cellophane entrapment as they enter a tropical jungle filled with gigantic vines, creepers, moss and a profusion of flowering plants-orchids, hibiscus, ferns and wide shiny palms. A tumbling

waterfall creates its own rainbow, as a fine mist shrouds the forest in muted green shadows, releasing a musky scent in the damp undergrowth. Some creatures are tiny-orange, brilliant blues, reds, black and white striped. Others have clever disguises-eyes to deter predators, bird-like markings or camouflage. Their wings are opaque like fine silk or velvet. Their delicate legs dangle like black strands of cotton, their antennae resemble filaments. Alighting on fragrant orange blossoms, perfectly balanced they quiver, pulsate and tremble as if in ecstasy, siphon-



ing sweet nectar through their curled proboscis. In pairs they are graceful ballerinas warming up before a performance, palpitating, vibrating, their wings effortlessly folding in on

themselves. Dancing in slow motion, they extend their wings in a mesmerizing rhythm, gliding like tropical fish amongst coral to create a magical kalei-

doscope of colours. They form a symphony, drifting, fluttering, hovering over sumptuous flowers. Like magnolia petals drifting in the breeze, they take flight once more.

We all get in the car and proceed to drive, after a couple of wrong turns we arrive at our car park. I watched the Gondola's over our heads, how scary, I will have to show great Nan and Par how brave I am when we step on the moving vehicle, The gates open and the conductor says that an assistance dog refused to step on last week, I took this comment in my stride and led the way onto the moving gondola guiding Ken, Mum, Pa and Great Nan. I am so proud I can do anything.

I get lots of treats and photos taken, and I saw a baby kangaroo or a wallaby, below the gondola, then we prepare to get out of the gondola to go to the restaurant for lunch, once again I show the way and throw my chest out showing my skills leading our party. The restaurant is very busy and we all sat outside, until the crowd moved on, I was given my mat and a treat, no pies or sangers for me. Everyone enjoyed the day and I will not be fearful of high flying moving vehicles and proved myself again. I behaved impeccably no barking or misbehaving. Oh and I didn't even chew the shoe just hid it from Great Nan.

As hundreds of thousands of Victorians begin preparing their property for fire season, emergency services are encouraging landowners to register any planned burn-offs online, through the Fire Permits Victoria website.

Landowners will be looking to take advantage of the spring conditions and authorities expect a surge in burn-off registrations over the coming weeks.

The quickest and easiest way to register your burn-off is by using the Fire Permits Victoria website at www.firepermits.vic.gov.au/notify.

Triple Zero Victoria Chief Operating Officer Nicole Ashworth said registering a burn-off online was quick and easy. "Using the Fire Permits Victoria website to register your burn-off helps keep our non-emergency phone lines free for higher priority calls," Nicole said.

"Every year at this time we see a spike in demand on the phone lines as landholders look to take advantage of suitable weather in the lead up to the fire danger period. This can sometimes lead to long wait times to register your burn-off."

CFA Chief Officer Jason Heffernan said the Fire Permits Victoria website is the preferred platform for community members to register their burns.

"By registering your burn-off, it allows emergency services to verify the fire is not an emergency and avoid unnecessary call outs for local brigades," Jason said.

"It also allows us to display burn-offs on the CFA website, preventing needless calls to Triple Zero (000)."

The website allows you to notify emergency services of your burn-off, and also check and apply for a permit, if necessary.

However, if your burn is taking place within the next two hours, you must register your burn via the phone line on 1800 668 511.

For more information about burning off safely, visit www.cfa.vic.gov.au/burnoff.

Before you notify us, make sure you:

- Follow regulations or laws by CFA and local council.
- Notify your neighbours if the burn will generate fire and smoke.
- Check the weather conditions are safe to burn. Postpone your activity if high fire risk conditions develop.
- Establish a gap in vegetation or fire break of no less than three metres cleared of all flammable material.
- There are enough people to monitor, contain and extinguish the burn safely and effectively. Never leave a burn-off unattended.

Russell and Carol are members of the Baw Baw Arts Alliance and the Warragul Camera Club and have exhibited their work over many years. Their new exhibition is the result of work during a month long stay in the Scottish Isle of Skye, where they worked with Nick Hanson of 'Skye Photography Academy', to improve and enhance their photography.

The photography academy conducts intensive five day programmes with clients who pay for tuition, accommodation and food, but Russell and Carol chose instead, an individualised programme with Nick so that they could take advantage of the best weather and lighting conditions across a month.

One of the challenges of photographing in a new environment is understanding the light, and in this case lighting conditions were very different from many areas in Australia. Russell and Carol looked for early morning locations at still water's edge in low, misty light, mornings when the sun shone off yellow green mountain tops, sunset evenings when grey pink skies enhanced rugged cliffs.

The exhibition, 'Glasgow to Skye, uncluttered', is of a wide range of photographic styles accompanied by Carol's textile work designed to reflect some of their experiences. The exhibition runs from October 31 to
